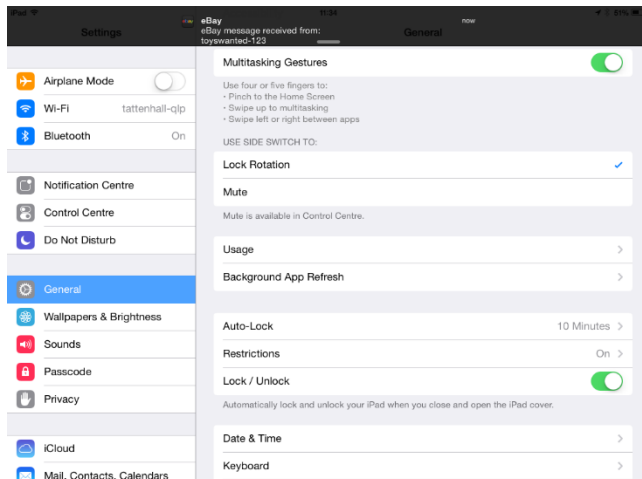
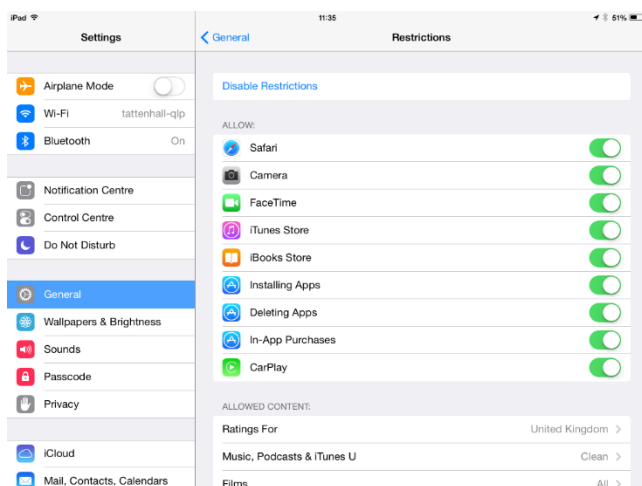
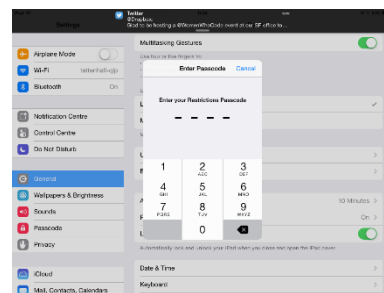


Enabling Parental Controls on an IOS Device

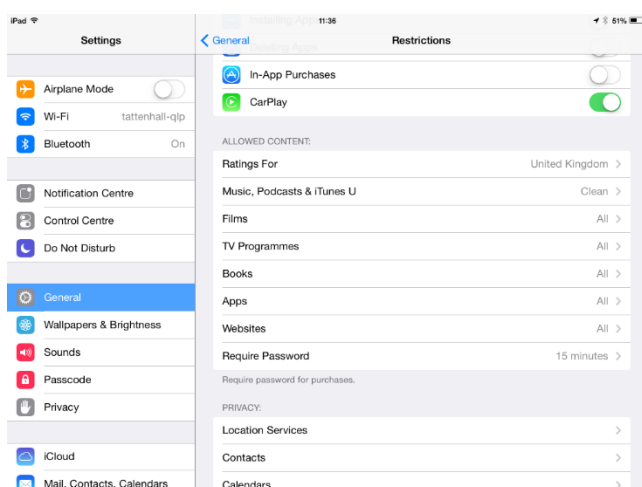


Parental controls can be found in the Settings under General. By default it is turned off. If enabled you will be prompted to enter a PIN number.

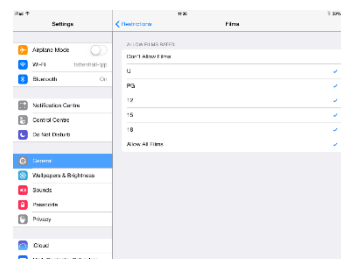


You are presented with a number of options to allow. Your selection will be dependent upon the age of the user and what you want them to do.

A good starting point would be to disable deleting apps, in-app purchases and probably installing apps. You should keep the account password to yourself,



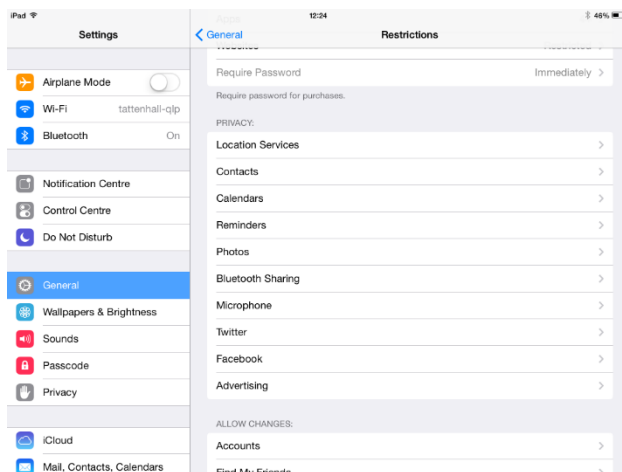
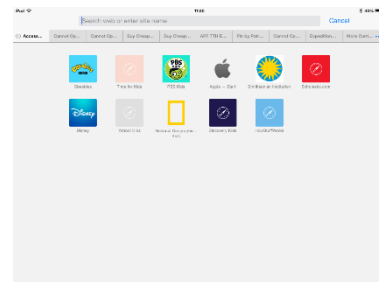
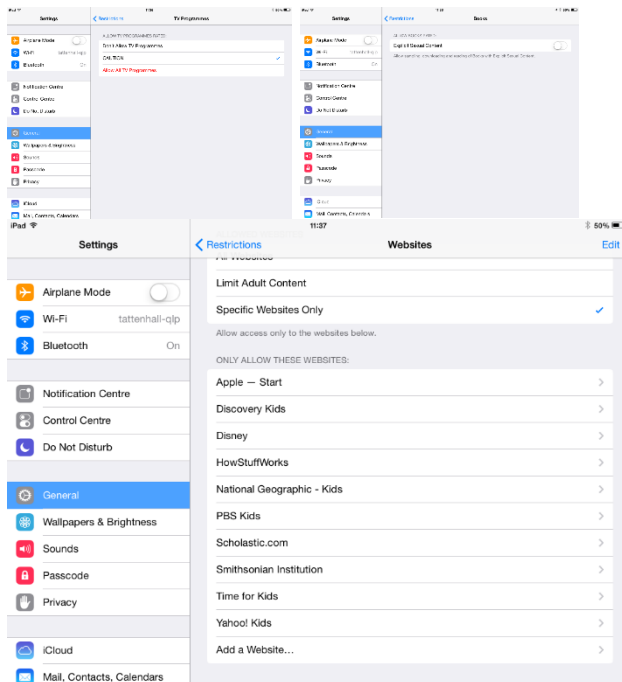
As you scroll down you can control content in terms of films, TV, books, apps and websites.



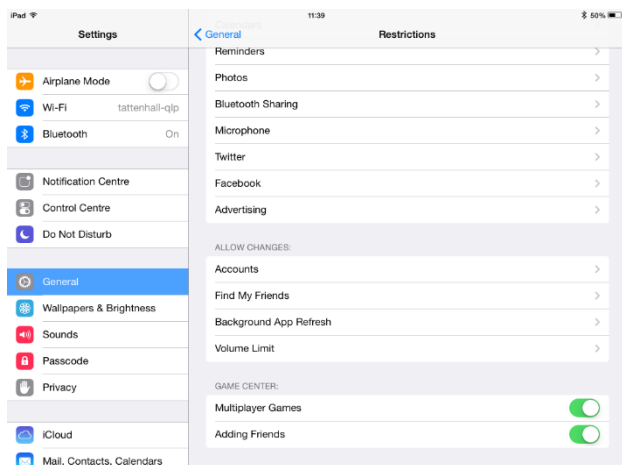
This generally uses industry standard categories.

Some content has fewer options to select and you would probably err on the side of caution.

You can restrict websites. The default position should probably be to Limit Adult Content but you can set your iPad up just to view specific websites.



The Privacy section allows you to secure your iPad from sharing a variety of personal information. Sometimes these services are useful for users so you need to balance what is appropriate with your view of personal privacy.



For example in Location Services it is probably a good idea to enable location for Google Maps but I would probably be more cautious about how I viewed t a social network using this information. You can prevent your users from making changes to the email accounts, Find My Friends list and the volume limit by locking these here.

Finally you can control how users use the game centre. With younger users you may want to disable multiplayer games and Adding Friends.
